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New Google data has shone a light on people's Google searches during Boris' premiership, revealing exactly where it all went wrong for him.

It highlights what people searched for about Boris Johnson himself, as well as the various scandals that ended his premiership.

The research was conducted by search agency Content Drive using data from Google Trends, Keyword Planner and SEO software Ahrefs to find out the most Googled queries about Boris Johnson during his time in power.

The research found some fascinating results. The second most-Googled query related to Boris Johnson was 'How many children does Boris Johnson have?' with an average of 9,700 searches a month.

The report also looked at some of the scandals that dogged the soon-to-be former Prime Minister.

Despite the Chris Pincher scandal ultimately being the final straw for many of his Cabinet, it seems that the public were far more outraged with the Partygate scandals and subsequent Sue Gray report into this. This was shown by the fact that

Patygate-related terms were the most searched for of all the scandals, with an average of 61,000 searches a month over the last 12 months.

Other scandals such as the Downing Street flat refurbishment, paid lobbying (Owen Patterson) and Chris Pincher drew much less attention online.

Johnson was often described as the 'Teflon PM' for his ability to avoid being fatally wounded by the scandals surrounding him. Search volume data from Google Trends revealing the peaks and troughs of public interest also supports this depiction. The data shows how short the public's attention span be meaning that our initial interest (and outrage) tends to be short-lived.

An interesting finding from the Google Trends data was that there were 23% more searches for the redacted Sue Gray report in January 2022 than for the full report in May, suggesting public interest waned and Boris Johnson did benefit politically from the various delays with the report.

It also showed how public interest in a scandal drops over time, with searches often flatlining after an initial spike as shown with searches for 'Downing Street Flat Refurbishment' falling to almost zero after they peaked in November 2021 and January 2022.

An inquest at East London Coroner's Court concluded Sumera was inappropriately transferred to a medical ward and died following a lack of clinical leadership, a lack of multi-disciplinary planning and lack of close monitoring as well as a lack of appropriate escalation in light of her deterioration before she suffered the cardiac arrest.

Husband Kasim, a delivery driver, said: "It's almost impossible to find the words to describe the hurt and pain our family feel. The last year has been a living nightmare which I wouldn't wish on anyone.

'Sumera was a wonderful wife and the best mum any child could ever want. She went out of her way to help others and her death at an age when she had her best years ahead of her, has been particularly difficult to come to terms with.

"Those few days and trying to come to terms with the death of Ayra, whilst Sumera was also slipping away from us is something I'm not sure I'll ever get

"When I saw Ayra she was beautiful. I just held her and cried my eyes out. I'll cherish what little but precious time I had with her.

"Being at Sumera's bedside and holding her hand as her body shut learned following the several concerns

down in front of my eyes and knowing there wasn't anything I could do to help or save her was heart-breaking.

'I couldn't stop thinking about our other children and how I was going to tell them their mummy wasn't coming

"For nearly a year we've had so many questions about what happened. While the inquest and listening to the evidence has been incredibly traumatic it was something I needed to do to honour Sumera's memory.

"I know nothing can bring Sumera back, or fill the void in our lives, but our family take some comfort in at least now having some answers to our questions. I just hope nobody else has

to go through the pain we have."
Taylor Hackett, the expert medical negligence lawyer at Irwin Mitchell representing Kasim, said: "This is a truly tragic case in which Kasim and the rest of Sumera's family remain traumatised by their loss. "Understandably Kasim has had a

number of concerns and questions about the events that unfolded in the lead up to his wife's death.

"While nothing can make up for what's happened we're pleased to have at least been able to support the family in their search for some answers.

that the inquest has identified in Sumera's care.

"In the meantime we'll continue to support the family to help them try and come to terms with their loss the best they can at this distressing time.'

Sumera, who tested positive for Covid-19 in late July was admitted to Whipps Cross by ambulance on 7 August after complaining of severe abdominal pain and increasing shortness of breath. She had sought medical advice in the previous days for her symptoms.

After initially being cared for on a labour ward she was moved to a medical ward in the early hours of 9 August after her respiratory function worsened.

Observations showed that Sumera was suffering an acute kidney injury and on 11 August her level of haemoglobin – protein that carries oxygen round the body – was considered to be concerning low, the inquest was told inquest was told.

In the early hours of the following morning on 12 August, 2021, her condition deteriorated, the hearing heard. At 7am she was administered blood thinners and not long after, the emergency buzzer was pressed and she required assistance from the healthcare staff. Her observations were monitored and she continued to deteriorate.



Shortly after 9am Sumera suffered a cardiac arrest. A decision was made to deliver Avra by caesarean section at 9.30am. Sadly, Ayra was born with no signs of life, CPR was commenced. Sadly, resuscitation attempts were unsuccessful and the decision to stop the resuscitation was made at 15 minutes of age.

In the meantime, Sumera was rushed to emergency surgery. During the surgery, doctors found a haematoma – collection of clotted

blood - in her abdomen, but couldn't locate the source of the bleeding, the inquest was told. Surgeons performed hysterectomy and Sumera was transferred to intensive care and put on a ventilator.

Sumera's condition continued to deteriorate and she sadly died on 14 August, 2021.

The inquest found she died from multiple organ failure, abdominal bleeding, Covid-19 infection and pneumonia.

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
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Research shows that almost one in five (18%) of British adults have experienced financial abuse in a current or past relationship. Of this, one in five women (21%) and one in seven men (15%) have been a victim.

Financial abuse is a type of domestic abuse where someone has power over you and your finances. There are several types of financial abuse, and sadly it can happen to anybody – regardless

of age, gender or ethnicity.

Credit management company Lowell has conducted research to reveal how confident Brits are in spotting the signs of financial abuse, in order to raise awareness around the hard-hitting topic.

A customer panel was asked about their experience with financial abuse, and found that 37% have been a victim of it directly, or know of someone who has.

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
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Johnson & Johnson to stop making and selling its talcbased baby powder

Johnson & Johnson (J&J) will stop making and selling its talc-based baby powder around the world from next year.

The announcement comes more than two years after the healthcare giant ended sales of the product in the US.

J&J faces tens of thousands of lawsuits from women who allege its talcum powder contained asbestos and caused them to develop ovarian cancer.

Talc is mined from the earth and is found in seams close to that of asbestos, which is a material known to cause cancer.

A 2018 investigation by the Reuters news agency claimed that J&J knew for decades that asbestos was present in its talc products

its talc products.
Reuters said that internal company records, trial testimony and other evidence showed that from at least 1971 to the early 2000s, J&J's raw talc and finished powders

positive for small amounts of asbestos.

In response to evidence of asbestos contamination presented in court rooms, media reports and to US lawmakers, the firm has repeatedly denied the allegations.

In October, J&J created a subsidiary, LTL Management, assigning its talc claims to it. It later placed it into bankruptcy, which paused the pending lawsuits.

Before the bankruptcy filing, the company faced costs from \$3.5bn (£2.87bn) in verdicts and settlements, including one in which 22 women were awarded a judgement of more than \$2bn.

Gaza: Calls for international investigation into killing of children

The Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) has confirmed that three children supported by the organisation's education and psychosocial support programme were among those killed in Al-Falluja cemetery, west of Jabalia refugee camp in the northern Gaza Strip on Sunday 7th August.

Jan Egeland, NRC's Secretary General said: "I am deeply heartbroken by the news that three children who received trauma support and joined our education activities were among those killed during the escalation in Gaza over the weekend. I send my condolences to their families and friends.

"Our teams in Gaza had worked with the three boys to help them overcome the traumatic events they experienced during last year's May escalation. These children were needlessly killed in a conflict they had nothing to do with. They should have been allowed to dream of a better, safer future.

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
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Wealthy **Brits fleeing** UK to escape tax hikes

The Manchester-based firm, which is relebrating a decade in business this year, said the number of enquiries from people looking to escape the UK because of the rises in taxes has skyrocketed "fourfold" since the start of the Covid-19 pandemic in 2019.

"I want my experience to inspire other people, especially mature students, because the hard work and effort is well worth the rewards, and I've met lots of new friends.



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

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




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An increase in the number of non-COVID-19 respiratory infections should be expected this

winter, say scientists.
The warning comes following the results of a new study, published in The Lancet Regional Health – Europe, which found that over 55% of respiratory disease hospitalisations during the pandemic's peak were caused by non-SARS-CoV-2 infections.

The University Bristol-led study funded and conducted in collaboration with Pfizer, is the first to compare the number of hospitalisations from respiratory disease infections caused by

COVID-19 and non-SARS-CoV-2 infections.

Using data from 135,014 hospitalisations from two large hospitals in Bristol between August 2020 and November 2021, researchers identified 12,557 admissions attributable to acute Lower Respiratory Tract Disease (aLRTD) with patients admitted with signs or symptoms of respiratory infections including cough, fever, pleurisy, or a clinical or radiological aLRTD diagnosis.

Following further analysis showed

that hospitalisations, 55% (6,909) were due to infection with no evidence of SARS-CoV-2, while confirmed SARS-CoV-2 infection only accounted for 26% (3,178) of respiratory infections. The remaining 17% (2,161) were due to infection with no infective cause.

Adam Finn, Professor of

Paediatrics at the University of Bristol, Director of the Bristol Vaccine Centre at Bristol Medical School and lead of Bristol UNCOVER (Bristol

COVID Emergency Research Group), said: "What is really surprising from our

results is just how much other non-COVID respiratory infections there was during this time, other infections clearly didn't just disappear and despite significant public health measures, including both vaccination and non-pharmaceutical intervention such as masks, our findings show there was still a high incidence of non-COVID-19 disease causing hospitalisations alongside COVID-19 patients."

Dr Catherine Hyams, Post-Doctoral Clinical Research Fellow,

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Principal Investigator for the AvonCAP study and one of the study's lead authors at the University of Bristol, added: "Our results really highlight not only the huge burden of respiratory infection on the NHS and other healthcare

on the NAS and other heathcare systems, but also how bad things may get this winter.

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
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





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LanguageCert through the viewscope: How a man from South Africa achieved success passing his B1 SELT exam

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What tips do experienced HMO landlords give to new investors?

reate an HMO that you'd live in yourself" - this is the general, generic comment that we hear quite a lot from landlords.

And why not!

It's a great rule to live by, to develop and operate HMOs to...

I often poll self-managing HMO landlords for their tit-bits of advice once we have completed on their sales.

One recent client gave me these three key points;

1. Maintain the house to a standard that you would want it be to be if you were living in a room in shared house – as that decreases tenant turn and improves occupancy.


2. When refurbing or developing the property spend the money that buys away future maintenance - it works out cheaper and is less hassle even though it's a little more expensive at the beginning.

3. Location is everything – do your research before buying. This landlord had not only bought well and developed well but also

This landlord had not only bought well and developed well but also managed the properties to near full occupancy for nearly a decade and

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then sold at the peak of the market when the time was right to 'retire' from HMOs - as it happens, he's the sort of person who should be doing a course rather than sitting in the background!

I love the "buy away your maintenance" quote and have seen how this can keep HMOs more manageable and less costly to operate first-hand - notwithstanding the fact that, actually, they become nicer places for the tenants to live in for the long-term too..

I'm this instance, having obviously been to the HMOs in question the landlord "bought down his further maintenance" not just with good quality appliances, furniture and boilers, etc but with additions such as recessed coir matting in every entrance hall ("so even lazy tenants have their feet wiped when they come in"), floors tiles instead of carpets in heavy-use areas and shower board panels in the en-suites which are all designed to stand the test of time and the many occupiers that live there.

Wendy Whittaker-Large of Best Nest in Crewe gave the following sage words to me a while ago...

heating, cleaning and maintenance slave. "I have seen HMO landlords fail because they cannot navigate that tricky line between being the tenant's best friend, and being their master and squire. (Both of which are unreasonable)!

"There has to be a professional line drawn between yourself and your tenant so that you manage the relationship and expectations effectively. This is the way to keep tenants

long term and keep yourself sane!"

Some more great advice from an experienced operator.

Focusing on the people management with respect, tactfully and with experience plays a huge part in operating successful HMOs - it's a people business Wendy was essentially

But back to the opening comment, and the bit of advice we hear the most..

"Create an HMO that you'd live in yourself...

It wasn't until recently when a landlord improved this statement and, unknowingly, created an anecdote that I'll be using over and over again.

"My top tip on running HMOs successfully is to understand the nature of the relationship between yourself and your tenant. Whether you are an agent, investor or landlord, you need to have boundaries and also flexibility in that relationship".

You neither want to become so indifferent that the tenant feels irrelevant and unimportant nor become their personal

"I feel it's important to create an HMO that I'd live in myself, if I was in the same circumstance as the tenant..." she said.

With just the simple addition of "if I was in the same circumstance" this statement can

now be ubiquitous and apply to so many more HMOs and situations.

A light bulb went off for me, anyway!

Developing HMOs, contrary to what you see on Facebook, Instagram or on courses, isn't about creating high-spec, high-end boutique finishes in all circumstances or

It's not a one size fits all sort of thing.

about knowing market.....properly.

Sticking to the original sentiment "create an HMO that you'd be happy to live" may mean that you're actually developing a product that's not appropriate for the tenant type or the proposed use.

It may mean that you over spec (or under spec if you are a sloppy git yourself), over spend, or alienate your target tenants type.

The circumstances and living habits of HMO tenants vary so much across locations and demographics

Focus on the last part, "if I was in the same circumstance'

This creates a chance to actually consider the tenant you are catering the HMO for and for you to think about what's the best HMO that you could create for them.

If you were a young professional moving near London for the first time, what type of HMO would you want?

If you were an Eastern-European factory worker moving to Doncaster for 2 years, what type of HMO would you want? A student in Bristol?

Someone coming out of prison looking to

get themselves back on your feet?

If you worked in the hospitality industry and came home late from shifts? Or if you worked night shifts...

If you were a vulnerable person?
If you worked away from home Mon-Friday

in a different town/city?

You can't apply the same quote to all of these (and the many more that make up the HMO world) unless you add "if you were in the same circumstances'

It provides individual thought, tenant empathy and actually makes the developer/landlord think about creating the best HMO possible for the tenants they are appealing to.



efore you make an offer on a house, take time to consider all the factors.

Does the property and it's location meet your requirements? If the property needs a lot of work for example and you don't feel this has been considered in the price, you could try and negotiate.

Some buyers are in a more favourable negotiating position. If any of the following applies, be sure and let the agent know. It could make the difference between whether your offer or someone else's being accepted!

Let the estate agent/vendor know if you are a first time buyer, you are not in a chain (you haven't got anything to sell before you buy) and that you have a prearranged mortgage offer.

Before you make an offer find out the

seller's position. If they have had the property on the market for a long time they may be willing to accept a lower offer. On the other hand, a seller who is in no hurry to move may be more prepared to hold out for a higher price.

The process differs slightly in Scotland Request the Home Report. If you viewed the property and loved it, it's time to request the Home Report from the seller.

A Home Report (which is provided free of charge to the buyer) contains three

• the single survey which assesses the condition of the property

· the energy report which gives the property an energy efficiency rating

the property questionnaire which gives an overview of other useful information such as the property's Council Tax band and alterations that have been

If you want to proceed after seeing the Home Report, it is usual to ask your solicitor to note your interest to the seller's estate agent. Once this has been done your interest will be noted and you will be advised if a closing date is arranged.

If the seller accepts your offer, their solicitor will send a qualified acceptance letter to the buyer's solicitor.





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The last few years,

The last few years, particularly during the pandemic, has shown first hand the importance of digital skills.

During lockdown, millions relied on technology to work and stay connected from home, but it's not just remote working where digital literacy becomes

where digital literacy becomes important.

Why shortages happen

We're in an incredibly exciting

While there's a lot of scaremongering over robots

making humans redundant, the reality is we won't have enough humans to fill the jobs that are available. The issue is that they'll be less traditional or unskilled roles, but a great deal more skilled ones. This shift in the

balance is what is creating a major challenge for employers and nations alike, and one that needs fundamental change to address. And quick change at

that. Digital skills shortage falls down to three clear things

• Fear: a lot of people fear technology. They see digital roles as roles for 'techies', and as such, would never consider re-skilling. This is a major cultural challenge that needs to be overcome by employers, educators and

government alike.

• Awareness: even when people decide to explore the advancement of their digital skills, potentially while at school or university, or as a driver to a potential career change, there simply isn't enough awareness about how to go about developing digital skills, or how they can learn whilst working. It can easily become quite daunting.

Forfeiture: The Landlord's **Weapon Of Last Resort**

he economic climate for commercial tenants has never been tougher. Having survived the pandemic, many will now have to deal with the devastating effects of an

impending recession.

Some tenants' businesses may not survive whilst others will try to cling on, maintaining cashflow by neglecting to pay the rent. With a tenant on the brink of insolvency, most likely the landlord will just want them out. Commercial leases can seldom be brought to a close quickly and termination in the regular scheme of things can be a protracted process. If a landlord wants to cut a tenancy short based on the failures of the tenant, the only real option is

Forfeiture, in theory, allows the landlord to take back the property immediately by the means of "peaceable re-entry". The landlord simply re-enters the property, the lease ends and the landlord, if wise, changes the locks. Whilst attractive to most commercial landlords, forfeiture is however a legal minefield. The right to forfeit only exists if it is granted in the lease. Most modern leases will have such a clause but leases will have such a clause but leases granted informally or verbally will not. Where there is no forfeiture clause, there is no right to forfeiture.

Peaceable re-entry only applies to rent arrears. If the tenant's fault is a failure to repair or an unlawful

subletting then the tenant must first be given notice (known as a Section 146 Notice) to remedy the breach. The landlord must allow a reasonable time for the tenant to comply, with 'reasonable' depending on the nature of the

breach.

The biggest problem with forfeiture, however, is the landlord waiving the right to do so. The right to forfeit arises at a specific time (as per the clause in the lease). At that time, the landlord must elect whether or not to exercise the right of forfeiture and terminate the lease. If the relevant breach is ongoing, such as a subletting, then the right arises again the next day but if the breach was a one-off, such as a failure to pay a specific instalment of the reput then failure to exercise the rent then failure to exercise the right means the right is lost. The landlord cannot forfeit until

the next missed payment. The landlord's subsequent contact with the tenant is critical. If the landlord takes any step to confirm the ongoing nature of the lease that is communicated to the tenant – even chasing that last unpaid rent - then the

landlord-tenant relationship is reasserted and the right for that breach to forfeit is lost. Any landlord looking to get rid of a tenant quickly is therefore advised to keep in mind any dates on which the right to forfeit might arise, take legal advice if necessary and avoid communication with the tenant.

Post-forfeiture, the tenant can apply for relief, meaning that the lease is reinstated and the tenant returns. However this usually involves the tenant having to remedy the breach (i.e. pay the rent, and often the landlord's costs) before the Court will consider the application. However, such reinstatement is possible and landlords with new tenants about to move in should bear that in mind.

a new one comes along to replace it. Education going forward needs to become an agile 'whole career' thing, not just age 5-21 schooling. Retraining will just become the done thing.

Why tech skills are important

The modern world is

dominated by technology. Pretty much everything around us today is controlled by a computer, whether it's the cars we drive, the TVs we watch or the phones we use to communicate with.

And changing habits in things like shopping, which has shifted heavily to online, and even social interaction, are ensuring technology is a core part of society and not just a luxury

To respond to changing consumer habits, businesses are investing billions into technology. And a lot of that investment is in people and skills. There are various reasons why

de various feasons why people should develop digital skills, but the main reason is so they can keep up. We all know how far things like mobile phones and cars have advanced in the last decade alone. Fast forward 10 or 20 years, and who

It's a useful resource that not only explains how different mattresses are filled, but also offers advice on choosing the right bed for the right person and questions to ask retailers. A poll of 2,490 people by interiors

specialists Hilarys put mattresses at the top of the list of household product consumers most regretted buying. They found 29% regretted their purchase, compared to 25% for sofas and 19% for coffee machines.

- Do your research before you step inside the shop. Think about what your priorities/concerns are. Is it price, storage, access to the bedroom, mattress type or health issue? Make sure your retailer understands your needs.
- It's always a good idea to buy a mattress and base together as they are designed to work in harmony. However, if you only want to replace your mattress, make sure you measure your base first as bed sizes are not standardised, even if they have the same name (e.g. king size). Speak to your retailer to find out if the mattress suits the base. Also, be aware that your guarantee may be invalid when putting a new mattress on an old base.
- Try it! It may sound obvious but get on the bed and see how it feels. Don't be afraid to spend at least 10 minutes lying on the bed in your normal sleeping position. If you'll be sharing the bed, make sure you take your partner with you and try it out together.

- Ask how to look after the mattress. The retailer should be able to provide you with care instructions for the bed. For example, this will include details of how often you need to turn or rotate the mattress. If you live on your own, you may want a 'no-turn' mattress.
- While most beds sold in the UK are 'as described', not every manufacturer or retailer is honest, and some do sell beds with inaccurate descriptions of fillings, or even worse - second hand mattresses with a new cover. One way to be sure that what you are buying is safe, clean and as described is to look out for the 'NBF Approved' label. NBF members are independently audited to ensure they comply with flammability, hygiene and trade descriptions regulations.
- For partners of widely different size or weight (three stones or more), different mattresses might be a good option. Some manufacturers make double beds from two single mattresses zipped together or combine different degrees of firmness in a mattress.

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
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Long Covid action plan



Patients with long-lasting symptoms from Covid will have access to more convenient tests and checks closer to home, under new NHS measures

Specialist clinics, dedicated to long Covid, will now be able to send people for tests at local one stop shops and mobile clinics, rather than people going back to their GP practice for multiple different

Backed by an additional £90 million investment, the updated long Covid plan includes ambitions for all patients to have an initial assessment within six weeks to ensure they are diagnosed and treated

Latest estimates from the ONS show that around 1.6 million people in England are experiencing ongoing Covid symptoms lasting more than four weeks, with around one in five saying it has a significant impact on their daily life.

The plan, which has been developed with expert insights from patients, clinicians and partners across the health and care system, shows the NHS has already made significant progress on delivering the 10 commitments it set out for long Covid services just over one year

ago.
This includes establishing a nationwide network of 90 specialist long Covid clinics, 14 hubs for children and young people and investment in training and guidance to support GP teams in managing the condition. community

outreach van in Mid and South Essex is already seeing patients with suspected long Covid symptoms for booked appointments and walk-ins before referring them for further assessments where needed.

The mobile service offers a range of checks including blood pressure, heart rate, oxygen saturation, spirometry and other tests for breathlessness as well as electrocardiography.

Dr Kiren Collison, GP and chair of the NHS long Covid taskforce said: "Long Covid can be devastating for those living with it, and while we continue to learn more about this new condition, it's important people know they're not alone,

and that the NHS is here for them.

"In just under two years, the NHS has invested £224m to support people experiencing long term effects from Covid - from setting up specialist clinics, hubs for children, and an online recovery platform, to providing training for GP teams.
"These plan builds on this world-leading

care, to ensure support is there for everyone who needs it, and that patients requiring specialist support can access care in a timely and more convenient way."

Support

Many of those experiencing long term symptoms, will make a full recovery with support from their community healthcare or GP team, but for those suffering from the more complex and severe symptoms, the NHS has set up specialist long Covid clinics across the country.

Long Covid clinics offer a comprehensive multidisciplinary service including physical, cognitive and psychological assessments and psychological assessments and management and can also refer patients

for further rehabilitation, treatment and

other support.
Lizzie Burr, 62 from Warwick, was referred to her local specialist long Covid clinic, she said: "I caught Covid in early 2020 and initially managed my symptoms at home expecting they would pass, however over a month later I was still really poorly, and my condition didn't seem

to be improving.
"I was struggling with fatigue and breathlessness, which has severely limited my mobility, as well as nausea, loss of appetite and difficulty sleeping.
"I was referred to the long Covid clinic

in Stratford by my GP, and following an initial assessment, I received specialist support from a respiratory physio to improve my breathing, as well as a dietican who has helped me with food and

"Whilst I'm still in the process of recovery, I can't speak highly enough of the long Covid clinic, for me it's been a lifeline and has helped me both physically and mentally. I would encourage anyone who is worried about long Covid to seek help and speak to their GP team".

In the last year, over 45,000 people experiencing severe or complex symptoms have been seen by a specialist post-Covid service.

Anyone who is concerned about ongoing symptoms following Covid-19 can find information and advice on the NHS Your Covid Recovery website.

This online platform provides expert advice on what people can do if they are recovering from the infection, as well as what to look out for if symptoms persist and signposting on where to access support

for long lasting symptoms.

Since launching, the online service has been accessed by over 10 million people worldwide and is now available in 17 languages including Arabic, Chinese, Gujarati, Hindi, Polish, Ukrainian and Urdu.

If they remain concerned, or are not recovering as expected, they should contact their GP team.

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




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

With the new Game of Thrones prequel series 'House of The Dragon' premiering this month, the team at Preply have gone through the original show's past 8 seasons to provide a breakdown of the meanings surrounding the common words

CROW

The word crow is used as a nickname for the rangers of the Night's Watch, an army of soldiers clad in black with fur cloaks that guard the wall that separates the civilised land of Westeros from the dangerous tribes of Wildlings and White Walkers that lie far north bevond the wall. The nickname was given by the free-folk beyond the wall

as they fear trying to cross the wall.

Example: Ygritte: "In your hearts all you crows want to fly free." - Ygritte, Season 3 Episode 1.

HODOR

Spoilers ahead! Hodor is what we thought was the name of House Stark's stable keeper, a man that sadly cannot speak and only says the word Hodor.

He was a loved character and Hodor became an iconic catchphrase. However, after his heart wrenching death in season 6, we learn that Bran's gift as the three-eyed Raven gave Hodor the name from the future.


As Bran was present in Hodor's past looking at him as a young boy who could speak, Hodor died holding the door to stop the White Walkers. As Meera shouted "Hold the door" to Hodor as he died, a young Hodor in Bran's vision hears this and has a seizure, making him unable to speak and only being able to say the word "Hodor" for the rest of his life.

KHALEESI

Khaleesi is the title given to the queen of the Dothraki tribe over in Éssos, the eastern continent in Game of Thrones

The Dothraki are a tribe of brutal warriors that pillage and steal their way across the lands, brutally



murdering those that fight back. They're led by the Khal, and the wife of the Khal is known as the Khaleesi, which at first was Danearys Targaryen in the show as she married Khal Drogo.

Example: "I am a Khaleesi of the Dothraki. I am the wife of the great Khal and I carry his son inside me. The next time you raise a hand to me, will be the last time you have hands." -Daenerys Targaryen, Season 1 Episode 4.

MAESTER

Maester is the term given to those in Westeros who are "scholars, healers and learned men." Many are Doctors to the noble houses and they all wear black robes and chains around their necks that signify the skills and expertise each Maester holds.

Maesters study their craft at The Citadel, a town with an enormous building that acts as a university that holds a giant library and knowledge

for Maesters to hold. **Example:** "You're no maester.

Where's your chain?" - Jaimie
Lannister, Season 3 Episode 5

PYROMANCER

The word Pyromancer is the name given to those that specialises and practises divination in fire. This could either be a chemist such as Hallyne in King's Landing that makes the green explosive wildfire used to destroy Stannis Baratheon's fleet in season 2 and the King's Landing sept in season 6. Another example is the knight Berric Dondarion who has the magical ability to light his sword on

Example: "He had his pyromancer place caches of wildfire all over the city." - Jaimie Lanniseter, Season 3 Episode 5

R AVEN

Whilst we have DHL and Fed-Ex,

those in Game of Thrones had ravens. Reflecting real medieval history, the characters in Game of Thrones send each other mail and letters by sending the letter off with a raven in the hope the raven flies to the location they want to send the letter to. Whilst it doesn't seem like a very reliable courier service, the ravens seemed to always get to where they needed to in

the show. Impressive!

THE SEVEN

The Seven, also sometimes referred to as The Seven Faced God, or The New Gods, are the Gods predominantly worshipped by those throughout Westeros. The Seven have seven aspects: the Father, the Mother, the Maiden, the Crone, the Warrior, the Smith, and the Stranger. Not much is known about them, but they're regularly mentioned throughout the

Valyrian, divided into Low and High, is the language of the Valyrian Freehold, an empire that reigned uncontested for 5,000 years until a cataclysmic event known as 'The Doom' laid waste to the Valyrian capital.

As a result, Valyrian recorded history, spells, and knowledge were lost, as well as its dragons. Only one of the mighty families of dragonlords survived, House Targaryen. Valyrian steel is a form of metal that was forged in the days of the mighty Valyrian Freehold, and is extraordinarily sharp, strong, and expensive

Example: "Is that Valyrian?" - Robb Stark, Season 3 Episode 7

WARG

A warg is a person with the ability to enter the minds of animals and control them. In the stories of J.R.R. Tolkien, a warg is a "particularly evil" kind of wolf, says the Oxford English Dictionary. In Game of Thrones, Bran Stark, who is a warg, first encounters his abilities in dreams in which he sees through the eyes of his pet direwolf, Summer. He then goes on to learn how to control his abilities and see through the eyes of animals as well as

look back to events in the past. **Example:** "He's a warg. He can enter the minds of animals and see through their eyes." - Mance Rayder, Season 3 Episode 2

WILDLING

Wilding is a derogatory term for the Free Folk, people who live north of the Wall kept out of Westeros by the Night's Watch.

A wilding is also a plant that grows wild, a wild animal, or anything that is wild; not cultivated or domesticated. It also refers to the act or practice of going about in a group threatening, robbing, or attacking others, something which the Wildlings are stereotyped for.

Example: "We can learn to live with the wildlings, or we can add them to the army of the dead. Whatever they are now, they're better than that." Jon Snow, Season 5 Episode 5.

Fill up at a supermarket

Every month figures are released by the AA showing the cheapest places to buy fuel, and supermarkets are almost always the cheapest.

Drive as smoothly as possibleDriving as smoothly as possible will maximise your car's fuel efficiency. Accelerate gently - and importantly, avoid excessive speeds and heavy braking. Most dashboards now tell you your MPG - you could set yourself weekly targets to try and get this up. If you do, take note: many cars are most efficient when driven between 45mph and 50mph.

Driving on hills

On hills, gain momentum by accelerating a little before you reach them, then ease off as you drive up.

Take off roof boxes

Roof boxes create wind resistance and raise fuel consumption - take it off when not using it. Empty roof racks add 16% drag when driving

at 75mph, according to the Energy Saving

Mind the air con

Look at how often you use air con and heating - they drain fuel.

Remove extra weight inside

Declutter your car - extra weight means more fuel is needed to power the vehicle.

Keep tires inflated to right pressure

Check your tyres are inflated to the pressure stated in your owner's manual. Under-inflated or over-inflated tyres cut fuel economy.

Round trips are better

Warm engines are more efficient than cold ones, so making one round trip is better for fuel efficiency than several short journeys, even though the mileage could be the same.

Walk, cycle, run

Do you have to drive? Consider walking or cycling rather than driving for short journeys.
